RESEARCH BACKGROUND AND METHODS



SIAA is a national organisation which **promotes, supports and advocates** the principles and practice of <u>independent</u> advocacy in Scotland.



Research goal

Explore and articulate the **meaning of**"quality" in Scottish <u>independent</u>
advocacy to inform stakeholders involved in its delivery, management, and commissioning.



Research methods

To find out, we held **two facilitated sessions** with:

- Advocacy Partners
- Independent advocates
- Managers
- Civil servants
- Commissioners (Local authorities)
- Advocacy education specialists



The information gathered was later **analysed thematically**, identifying key themes and takeaways. Combined with **SIAA's organisational context**, these formed the basis for the five pillars of quality <u>independent</u> advocacy.



FIVE PILLARS OF QUALITY INDEPENDENT ADVOCACY



Advocacy Partners' experience



Quality independent advocacy places

Advocacy Partners' experience at its core.

Quality independent advocacy uses evidence to enable learning and continuous improvement.



Evidence-based improvement

On-going learning and development



Quality independent advocacy requires on-going training and development of skills.

Quality independent advocacy is delivered, managed, and commissioned according to shared standards.



Alignment in shared standards

Effective regulation



Effective regulation of independent advocacy enables **consistent application** of shared standards across models and regions, supporting quality.



KEY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ORGANISATIONS AND PRACTICIONERS





- Proactively meet **accessibility** requirements.
- Have effective referral systems in place (timely access).
- Communicate gaps in resource to commissioners/funders.
- Strengthen engagement with communities.
- Have effective and accessible systems for collecting, reviewing, acting on evidence (including feedback).
- Ensure that measurement is **meaningful to all stakeholders**, including collective advocacy groups.





- Engage in regular reflective practice.
- Create spaces to identify **further development areas.**
- Protect time and resources for all workers' development.
- Ensure that **internal procedures and processes** reflect the shared standards.
- **Participate in discussions** about shared standards and speak up when they don't reflect realities of the work.
- When **standards change**, ensure that they reflect Advocacy Partners' and communities' needs.





 Actively contribute to shaping regulation, ensuring that contributions align with shared standards and reflect the experiences of Advocacy Partners and the communities the organisation supports.



KEY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR COMMISSIONERS AND FUNDERS





- Focus on Advocacy Partners' experience as the core purpose of evaluation and reporting.
- Work with organisations to understand local needs and allocate resources appropriately.
- Local Advocacy Plans should provision for a range of **independent advocacy models.**
- Work with organisations to allocate **appropriate funds** for evaluation activities.
- Structure the reporting activities to support organisations in learning from gathered information, and use it to improve understanding of the local need for independent advocacy.





- Work with organisations to ensure sufficient funding is allocated for training and skills development.
- Stay up to date with developments (practice, legislation, communities' needs) and participate in training opportunities.
- Stay up to date with developments (**shared standards**), ensuring the use of **most recent versions**.
- Use shared standards as the **foundation** during **all stages** of commissioning.
- Work with organisations to understand the local context, and use that information to complement the foundation built on shared standards.
- Support organisations in evaluating their work against shared standards.





KEY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR POLICYMAKERS





- Involve Advocacy Partners and collective advocacy groups meaningfully in the development of regulations.
- **Embed flexibility** allowing organisations to respond to **local contexts** and community needs.
- Support professionals by establishing **clear**, **consistent criteria** for when and how **referrals** should be made.
- Encourage the use of evidence as a tool for learning.
- Monitor and review the **impact of regulations**, ensuring they adapt to evolving communities' needs.





- Stay up to date with sector developments (practice, legislation, communities' needs) and participate in training opportunities.
- Support **initiatives** that facilitate **on-going learning** across the sector.
- Ensure that **best practice guidance** is regularly reviewed and updated. This includes both the creation of **new guidance** and the **revision of existing documents**.





- Ensure legislation includes a full, sector-agreed definition of independent advocacy.
- Clearly outline shared standards in regulations and their application across all levels of delivery and commissioning.
- Build-in mechanisms for **updating the regulations** and ensure meaningful stakeholder involvement.



SIAA'S ROLE AND NEXT STEPS





SIAA upholds the pillars through:

- Advocating for a full definition and recognition of all models of independent advocacy in legislation and regulation.
- **Building relationships** across the sector, facilitating opportunities for dialogue.
- Leading the co-creation of foundational documents.
- **Collaborative approach to learning**, remaining responsive to members' needs.
- Working with policymakers and commissioners to improve understanding of independent advocacy.

Looking ahead: Future opportunities



Explore ways for **people with lived experience** to actively contribute to the development of independent advocacy.



Enhance accessibility of our publications (Easy Read).



Embed human rights into independent advocacy practice through additional learning resources and training.



Improve **understanding and support** of the **less common models** of independent advocacy (collective, citizen, peer).



Develop a resource bringing together regulations, shared standards and guidance.

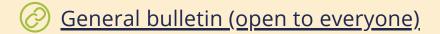
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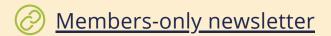

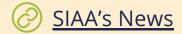
